From the Director

Welcome to the inaugural issue of *From the King's Table*, the newsletter of the Oklahoma Baptist University Prison Divinity Program. The title comes from 2 Kings 25:29 because it summarizes a brief yet powerful story of renewed hope. After 37 years of being held captive by the Babylonian king, Jehoiachin was pardoned. The Hebrew text literally says the king "lifted up the head" of Jehoiachin. In other words, he restored his dignity. He gave him hope. Yet, he remained in the presence of his captor. He was not completely free but he was given a place of honor and dined regularly at the king's table. Jehoiachin's elevated status also brought hope to the people of Judah that one day their exile might come to an end.

Likewise, the students in our Prison Divinity Program have been given a wonderful opportunity of hope. After receiving 172 applications from inmates across the state and interviewing 65 applicants, 40 men were chosen for the program. Some will discover renewed purpose. Others will find a new depth to their purpose. All will be impacted by this community of learning. So, although remaining in prison, for the moments we are in the classroom engaging with God's Word and God's world through a Christian liberal arts education, they can lay aside their prison clothes and feast at the table of our King. We also pray that OBU's presence in the prison brings hope to other inmates - the hope of opportunity but, more importantly, the hope in Christ.

The Prison Divinity Program transforms the lives of incarcerated individuals to redeem both the self and the system through the resurrection power of Jesus Christ by providing a learning environment and program of study that leads to a reformed perspective on life which results in a redirected purpose for life.

The indepth biblical education that I can gain through the OBU Prison Divinity Program will give me the knowledge, training, and discipline needed to more effectively reach and disciple men in my community for Christ. - Vince

I'm not sure why I'm applying [to the program]. I have been praying for my ears to hear. The Lord said all these years I have been listening to lies. Lies from the devil. I know that the devil has already lost. But now it's time to know the truth. - lames

I've been in a gang most of my life. . . These penitentiaries and my family are full of gang members, people that are hurting, confused and searching for Christ and don't even know it. With the completion of this degree, I'll be better equipped to speak to these people, to serve them, guide them to Christ, and be a better leader. - Delma
